



Foxes Class Medium Term Planning for RE Autumn Term 2022

Focus Religions:

- Hinduism: Diwali
- Christianity: Christmas

This topic will be continually developed throughout the curriculum every day. My classroom and the school building will be accessed daily and children will be supported to make transitions. There will be specific planned opportunities to support the children's progress and may be altered to suit the needs of the children during the term.

<u>Lesson 1 - Link it.</u> <u>What are religions?</u> Explore religious artefacts and photos which we may know (Christianity). Explore some Hindu artefacts - discuss what is familiar (e.g. candles) and what is not? What is the same and what is different about Christianity and Hinduism (explore different religious symbols).	<u>Lesson 2 - Learn it.</u> <u>Explore Hindu themes</u> Explore Hinduism themes: beliefs and practices, festivals, worship, rituals and ways of life in order to find out the meanings behind them.	<u>Lesson 3 - Check it</u> <u>Compare Religions</u> Make comparisons between Hinduism and our Christian/Atheist practices. What is the same, what is different?	<u>Lesson 4 - Show it</u> <u>Diwali</u> We will celebrate Diwali in our class. We will have music, taste food, create decorations and dance.	<u>Lesson 5 - Know it</u> <u>Sorting/Reflecting</u> We will reflect upon our experiences of Diwali and Christmas. What would we enjoy/not enjoy? We will relate learning to our own experiences and community.
